- 1 It is given that

$$\mathbf{A} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & -1 & -2 \\ 0 & 2 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & -3 \end{pmatrix}.$$

Write down the eigenvalues of $\mathbf{A}$ and find corresponding eigenvectors.

- 2 The integral I_n , where n is a non-negative integer, is defined by

$$I_n = \int_0^1 x^n e^{-x^3} dx.$$

By considering $\frac{d}{dx}(x^{n+1}e^{-x^3})$ or otherwise, show that

$$3I_{n+3} = (n+1)I_n - e^{-1}. \quad [3]$$

Hence find I_6 in terms of e and I_0 .

- 3 Verify that if

$$v_n = n(n+1)(n+2) \dots (n+m),$$

then

$$v_{n+1} - v_n = (m+1)(n+1)(n+2) \dots (n+m). \quad [2]$$

Given now that

$$u_n = (n+1)(n+2) \dots (n+m),$$

find $\sum_{n=1}^N u_n$ in terms of m and N .

- 4 Prove by mathematical induction that, for all positive integers n , $10^{3n} + 13^{n+1}$ is divisible by 7. [5]

- 5 Show that if $a \neq 3$ then the system of equations

$$\begin{aligned} 2x + 3y + 4z &= -5, \\ 4x + 5y - z &= 5a + 15, \\ 6x + 8y + az &= b - 2a + 21, \end{aligned}$$

has a unique solution.

Given that $a = 3$, find the value of b for which the equations are consistent.

- 6 The roots of the equation

$$x^3 + x + 1 = 0$$

are α , β , γ . Show that the equation whose roots are

$$\frac{4\alpha + 1}{\alpha + 1}, \quad \frac{4\beta + 1}{\beta + 1}, \quad \frac{4\gamma + 1}{\gamma + 1}$$

is of the form

$$y^3 + py + q = 0,$$

where the numbers p and q are to be determined.

Hence find the value of

$$\left(\frac{4\alpha + 1}{\alpha + 1}\right)^n + \left(\frac{4\beta + 1}{\beta + 1}\right)^n + \left(\frac{4\gamma + 1}{\gamma + 1}\right)^n,$$

for $n = 2$ and for $n = 3$.

- 7 The curve C has equation

$$r = 10 \ln(1 + \theta),$$

where $0 \leq \theta \leq \frac{1}{2}\pi$. Draw a sketch of C .

Use the substitution $w = \ln(1 + \theta)$ to show that the area of the sector bounded by the line $\theta = \frac{1}{2}\pi$ and the arc of C joining the origin to the point where $\theta = \frac{1}{2}\pi$ is

$$50(b^2 - 2b + 2)e^b - 100,$$

where $b = \ln(1 + \frac{1}{2}\pi)$.

- 8 Given that

$$2y^3 \frac{d^2y}{dx^2} + 12y^3 \frac{dy}{dx} + 6y^2 \left(\frac{dy}{dx}\right)^2 + 17y^4 = 13e^{-4x}$$

and that $v = y^4$, show that

$$\frac{d^2v}{dx^2} + 6\frac{dv}{dx} + 34v = 26e^{-4x}.$$

Hence find the general solution for y in terms of x .

- 9 With O as origin, the points A , B , C have position vectors

$$\mathbf{i}, \quad \mathbf{i} + \mathbf{j}, \quad \mathbf{i} + \mathbf{j} + 2\mathbf{k}$$

respectively. Find a vector equation of the common perpendicular of the lines AB and OC .

Show that the shortest distance between the lines AB and OC is $\frac{2}{5}\sqrt{5}$.

Find, in the form $ax + by + cz = d$, an equation for the plane containing AB and the common perpendicular of the lines AB and OC .

- 10** The curve C has equation

$$y = x^2 + \lambda \sin(x + y),$$

where λ is a constant, and passes through the point $A(\frac{1}{4}\pi, \frac{1}{4}\pi)$. Show that C has no tangent which is parallel to the y -axis. [5]

Show that, at A ,

$$\frac{d^2y}{dx^2} = 2 - \frac{1}{64}\pi(4 - \pi)(\pi + 2)^2. \quad [5]$$

- 11** Prove de Moivre's theorem for a positive integral exponent:

$$\text{for all positive integers } n, (\cos \theta + i \sin \theta)^n = \cos n\theta + i \sin n\theta. \quad [5]$$

Use de Moivre's theorem to show that

$$\cos 7\theta = 64 \cos^7 \theta - 112 \cos^5 \theta + 56 \cos^3 \theta - 7 \cos \theta. \quad [4]$$

Hence obtain the roots of the equation

$$128x^7 - 224x^5 + 112x^3 - 14x + 1 = 0$$

in the form $\cos q\pi$, where q is a rational number. [4]

12 Answer only **one** of the following two alternatives.

EITHER

The curve C has equation

$$y = \frac{x^2 + qx + 1}{2x + 3},$$

where q is a positive constant.

- (i) Obtain the equations of the asymptotes of C . [3]
- (ii) Find the value of q for which the x -axis is a tangent to C , and sketch C in this case. [4]
- (iii) Sketch C for the case $q = 3$, giving the exact coordinates of the points of intersection of C with the x -axis. [3]
- (iv) It is given that, for all values of the constant λ , the line

$$y = \lambda x + \frac{3}{2}\lambda + \frac{1}{2}(q - 3)$$

passes through the point of intersection of the asymptotes of C . Use this result, with the diagrams you have drawn, to show that if $\lambda < \frac{1}{2}$ then the equation

$$\frac{x^2 + qx + 1}{2x + 3} = \lambda x + \frac{3}{2}\lambda + \frac{1}{2}(q - 3)$$

has no real solution if q has the value found in part (ii), but has 2 real distinct solutions if $q = 3$. [4]

OR

The curve C has equation

$$y = x^{\frac{1}{2}} - \frac{1}{3}x^{\frac{3}{2}} + \lambda,$$

where $\lambda > 0$ and $0 \leq x \leq 3$. The length of C is denoted by s . Prove that $s = 2\sqrt{3}$. [4]

The area of the surface generated when C is rotated through one revolution about the x -axis is denoted by S . Find S in terms of λ . [5]

The y -coordinate of the centroid of the region bounded by C , the axes and the line $x = 3$ is denoted by

h . Given that $\int_0^3 y^2 dx = \frac{3}{4} + \frac{8\sqrt{3}}{5}\lambda + 3\lambda^2$, show that

$$\lim_{\lambda \rightarrow \infty} \frac{S}{hs} = 4\pi. \quad [5]$$

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
