1 It can be a struggle to maintain a balanced diet when you are at university but finding a healthy way to eat on a budget is very important for well-being. Following some basic steps will help you to keep your energy levels high while avoiding the need to spend too much.

- Plan your meals carefully and calculate a weekly budget. A budgeted weekly shop is often cheaper.
- Save one day a week to do a big shop. Stock up on all your items in one trip and you'll save money.
- Add fruit or vegetables to every meal. Even if that means adding a handful of carrots, a banana or some apple slices. This ensures you're getting essential nutrients each time you eat.
- Remember that frozen vegetables can be very cheap, last a long time and retain their nutritional value, so make sure you add them to your shopping list.
- If you must eat fast food, choose carefully and don't eat it all the time. Fast food may taste great but it's not usually nutritious!

Here are some tips about healthy eating when studying and attending classes.

- It is important to fuel your body while studying. Healthy snacks such as whole wheat crackers, fresh or dried fruit, rice cakes and unbuttered popcorn can help you do this. Why not also try raw vegetables with a cottage cheese or low-fat dip?
- There are few nutrients in sugar but many calories so apply it moderately. Consider ways of reducing how much sugar you consume by sweetening your favourite drinks and cereals with artificial sweeteners.
- Drink lots of water. Make sure you always have your drinks bottle with you to ensure that you drink at least the eight glasses of water a day that your body needs, whether that is in class or during late night study sessions.
- Take a packed lunch or healthy snacks with you if you are attending classes most of the day. If you do this, you can control what you eat more easily and potentially save money.

And here are some more tips.

- Eating a meal filled with slow-release carbohydrates, healthy fats, and lean proteins can help give your brain a boost and keep you focused.
- Don't overload on caffeine. A smoothie can be a healthier option than more tea and coffee!
- Try not to skip meals. For example, make sure you eat breakfast even if it is only a piece of fruit and a drink of juice.

In summary, enjoy your food but take time to plan your meals and make sure your diet is balanced.

Text 3 Climate Change and Sport

Read the first part of this article about climate change and sport.

- 1 Climate change is affecting sporting events around the world and it's predicted that this situation will only worsen over future decades. Some athletes have been struck by dangerous conditions as temperatures have continued to rise.
- 2 An example of this is in the Japanese capital, Tokyo, during the recent Olympic Games, held in the summer of 2021, when temperatures hit 34 °C. Since the first time the Olympics were held in Tokyo in 1964, the city has been getting quite a bit hotter. Temperatures have risen by 2.9 °C since 1900, almost three times the global average. This is largely because the city has been encased in so much concrete that warm air gets trapped, leading to an "urban heat-island effect".
- 3 During Tokyo 2020, a number of tennis players retired mid-match with heat exhaustion. Another tennis player said the conditions were tougher than anything he had experienced in a 20-year career. "You're constantly dehydrated, you feel you have weights on your shoulders because there's so much heat and humidity. You can also get headaches and feel dizzy," he said.
- 4 Water sports in Tokyo offered no relief. Long distance swimmers had to wake up before dawn so their event could start at 6.30 am and finish before the worst of the morning heat. Even so, the water temperature in Tokyo Bay rose to 29 °C, which was described as being as "hot as soup".

- 5 During the Olympics many countermeasures were used to cool athletes down, including ice jackets, mist-sprays, salt tablets and events were rescheduled to cooler evenings. Scientists have suggested that 'heat desks' for treatment should be set up at similar future events, which would include cool-down baths.
- 6 Rising temperatures could limit the range of sports which require prolonged activity in terms of geography, season and time of day. Pressure will grow for some big sporting events to be moved to cooler seasons, higher latitudes, morning and evenings.
- 7 In another example of the effects of climate change on sport, bush fires in Melbourne, Australia, disrupted the Open Tennis tournament there due to poor air quality. Once play resumed, one player had to retire due to a coughing fit. Scheduled horse race meetings in two separate Melbourne suburbs were also cancelled due to the smoke haze.
- 8 In addition, football is likely to be affected by climate change. Extreme weather such as snow, ice and extreme heat will lead to games being cancelled or postponed. An analysis has shown that 23 of 92 English football league clubs will face partial or total annual flooding of their stadiums by 2050. Ticket sales will be lost and the cost of repairing the damage could be prohibitive.
- 9 Athletes can adapt to a changing climate only up to a certain point. They can do lots of acclimatisation training, but there is a point when the body reaches its breaking point. Players can just about play football at 40 °C, but all the quality goes out of the game. When it reaches those extremes, organisers have to move things around, schedule in the evening or choose a different date in the calendar. The Football World Cup in Qatar has been moved to the winter for this reason.
